

Firearm Facts & Figures

National Background Check System and Private Sale Loopholes:

- **Millions of records** of mentally ill and violent offenders are missing from the national gun background check database.
- The background check system has kept over **2 million** criminals and other dangerous people from buying guns at licensed dealers.¹
- **40% of private firearm transfers** take place between private individuals², without a background check, representing more than **6.6 million** gun transfers a year.
- A national survey of inmates found that nearly **80 percent of those who used a handgun in a crime acquired it in a private transfer.**³
- Intrastate gun trafficking is **48 percent lower** in states that require background checks for handgun sales.⁴

Assault Weapons and High Capacity Magazines:

- High capacity magazines are used in 14 to 26 percent of gun crimes and in 31 to 41 percent of fatal police shootings.⁵
- Recent mass shootings involving assault weapons and/or high-capacity magazines resulted in 54% more people killed and 123% injured and killed than in other mass shootings.⁶

Gun Deaths in the U.S. and in New York:

- In 2010, 31,672 people were killed by firearms in the United States.⁷
- In 2010, 1,011 people killed by firearms in the State of New York.⁸

Gun Deaths and Law Enforcement:

- **3 times** as many law enforcement officers die in states with weak gun laws. These same states frequently also export crime guns at high rates to other states with stronger laws like New York.⁹

Guns and Kids:

- **3,459** kids under 21 years old killed by guns in 2010, including 139 in New York.¹⁰

Guns in the Home:

- Guns in the home are **22 times** more likely to be involved in accidental shootings, assaults/homicides or suicide attempts, than to be used to injure or kill in self-defense.¹¹
- The risk of homicide is **3 times** higher in homes with firearms.¹²
- Keeping a gun in the home increases the risk of suicide by **17 times.**¹³

Domestic Violence:

- Guns are the most common weapon used in domestic violence against women and access to firearms increases the risk of homicide by more than **5 times.**¹⁴
- Firearms were used to kill **more than two-thirds** of spouse and ex-spouse homicide victims between 1990 and 2005.¹⁵
